## Speech given at the St. Thomas Alumni Reception Ottawa, October 25, 2006

President Higgins, Fellow St. Thomas University Alumni, Guests, Friends,

I would like to take this opportunity to extend you a warm welcome. I am always quite eager when I have the opportunity to see how the education and life experience gained by students, while at St. Thomas, has assisted them in their endeavors since they graduated. Alumni receptions such as these provide us with an opportunity to become reacquainted with the community from which we came. Your presence here this evening reaffirms your ongoing membership to this community.

Alumni is one of the many titles that you bare and it is also a title that lends definition to your life in certain respects.
