We are gathered here today to welcome the Olympic flame to Parliament Hill. Starting in Greece, it has traveled halfway around the world, just the beginning of its journey as it has already gone from coast to coast to coast across Canada and is now on its way back to British Columbia again.

The Olympic flame and the Torch which carries it is a powerful symbol of peace and unity between the nations and peoples of the world. It is also a symbol of fierce competition and equally fierce friendships formed before, during and after that competition.

The Olympic flame represents the Olympic spirit, and that spirit is alive and well in Canada. Know that we are behind you in your pursuit of excellence, that we ask only that you do your best and that Canadians wish you well. Above all, take with you the certain knowledge that we are proud of all of you.
